JUDGING SCHOOL

Because I am convinced that good judges are the most important factor (next to fiddlers themselves) in improving Oldtime fiddle contests, a training session for Oldtime Fiddle judges is planned for Nov. 18, 1972 at a location not yet selected. Instruction will be given by a qualified instructor who knows old time fiddling and how to judge a contest. A \$5.00 fee will be charged.

Each person attending will actually score fiddlers, and their scores will be examined and evaluated. All interested persons are invited to attend. You don't need to be a fiddler or an accompanist. There will be much to learn from this session, weather you are an experinced judge or have never judged at all.

At the conclusion of the day's training everyone who qualifies will be asked to become a member of the Fedration of Old Time Fiddling Judges.

Attending this training session is one way we in Oregon can set the example for the rest of the country in haveing competent, knowledgeable judges.

This motion was seconded, and after some discussion passed with only one dissenting vote. Mr. Buckman gave for his reason for the motion that recordings help to stimulate and spread interest in oldtime fiddling, so there should be no charge made by the Association to those selling them.
