OPEN LETTER TO COOS COUNTY OLDTIME FIDDLE PARTICIPANTS

A public thank you is due all the fine people who entered, accompanied, and helped in Myrtle Point.

An apology is due the contestants in the Senior Division. For the following reasons we failed to intervene in a rules infraction protest which resulted in a placement dispute. (1) The fairboard let us down and we were forced to assume tasks which were to be handled by others so we were to pre-occupied to intervene before the contest was over. (2) We are new at fiddling and contests, so did not feel qualified to intervene after the judges decision. (3) Neither of us play the fiddle so were not sure of the fiddlers opinion on the subject (Boy, now we are.)

A contest is being discussed for next year and it is our hope you will accept our apology and assurance that we have learned "lots and gobs" and things will be better if not bigger.

We close with a question: Do the fiddlers feel a uniform system must be found to correct obvious infractions of written rules which the judges miss? We do. See you fiddling around.

MORE ABOUT JUDGES TRAINING NOV. 18th

When I first brought up the subject of a training session for oldtime fiddle contest judges I said that it seemed to me that knowledgeable judges were the most urgently needed thing in fiddle contest today. What I didn't realize, how ever, was the extent of the interest there would be in such a training session. Many people have asked me about it, including out of state fiddlers and officers in other state fiddle associations. Obviously, the time is right for such a project. Everyone who is genuinely interested will be welcome. The good news is that Kelly Kirksey has made a truly miraculous recovery from the stroke he had during the National Contest, and will almost surely be able to conduct the session, as planned.

Kenny Brank brought up some good questions about the evaluation of scores and how it will be determined who qualifies to be invited to become a member of the Federation of Old Time Fiddling Judges. I will try to give a brief answer now and next month write a complete agenda of what has been proposed for the entire session.

Evaluation and comparison of scores will be done by everyone, so it will be a group evaluation as well as by Kelly.

To be invited to become a member of the Federation of Old Time Fiddling Judges will depend on two things; First, you must honestly feel that you know enough about oldtime fiddling to be able to judge it competently. (either from a great deal of listening to it, or fiddling yourself, or both) Second: everyone who understands, believes in, and will pledge to practise the Federation system of scoring will be invited to join the Federation. More about this next month.

TO THE HOEDOWNER

After several years of experience in putting on contest, it seems that the Oregon Fiddlers Assoc., and the sponsors of such contest; have not learned much about what a contest consists of. A fiddling contest, in my opinion, should be run so as to satisfy; 1. The Fiddlers 2. the Audience, and 3. the Sponsor. And it is plain that there would be no contest if the three mentioned parties are not there to play, see and properly sponser. Any contest should be set up with categories for. 1. Seniors, 2. Ladies, 3. Juniors and 4. Opens, and 5. Intermediate Division. But you might say; "We don't know if there will be enough contestants in some of the division." In dosn't matter if there is but one who comes to play, or a dozen, the opertunity should be presented so a contesant from any of these divisions can play if he or she does come to a contest.

The contest at Canyonville is a glaring example of what has been left out in the provisions for any contestant to enter his proper division. The Senior division was not mentioned in the Hoedowner, or any other advertising that I've heard about that contest, why were the Seniors not included? There cannot be a valid reason for not including the Seniors. After all, if it were not the the Seniors, there might not be any other Division, as the Seniors now began this Fiddling back when and they are still going strong. (Let's keep this Senior age limit down to not younger than 65 yrs.)

And we need to become educated on "How to judge a contest." Either that, or lets forget rules. It seems that a contestant can play any tunes he feels like playing for his third tune and get by with it. If the rules states, "the third tune cannot be a waltz or a hoedown," a judge should know enough about fiddling to give a fiddler a zero if he violates that rule and plays another hoedown, or another waltz for his third tune. Let's get organized.
