CONTEST ILWACO, WASHINGTON SAT. NOV. 25th

Preliminaries start at 1:00p.m. with finals at 7:00p.m. The contest will be in the new school auditorium in Ilwaco. Judging will be remote. Five categories: Ladies, Juniors Intermediates, Seniors and Reglars or open, Age limits: Jrs. of either sex under 18, Ladies 18 and older. Seniors of either sex 70 and older. Intermediates of either sex 18 to 70. Opens of either sex 18 to 70. To qualify as an Intermidiate a fiddler will be eligible if they have not won first in any Intermediate contest, have not placed in top five in any state or Regional contest, or in top 20 at Weiser, Idaho. Fiddlers must be signed in before start time of category in which they will play. Ladies first, Juniors second, Intermediates third, Seniors fourth and Opens last. Please, all fiddles tuned to the piano on stage so all can play in the gropp playing. No electrified instruments will be allowed. Each fiddler can have no more than two accompanists, or he may play without an accompanist if he wishes. ENTRY FEE: None for Ladies or Juniors. \$2.00 each for Intermediates and Seniors, and \$3.00 each for Opens. Each fiddler will be required to play three tunes, each of a different type for each round of play. If he plays two tunes of same type in one round, he will recieve no score for the repeat type tune. Fiddlers cannot play the same tune twice during the contest. If he does, he will recieve a zero for the repeat tune. Each fiddler must play one Hoedown per round. He can play the Hoedown first, second, or last if he wishes. And he can choose from one each of the following types for his two other tunes: Polka, Jig. two-step. Waltz or Schottishhe. UNDERSTAND THIS RULE. Fiddler need not play a waltz, but can do so if he wishes, the same goes for the jig, polka, two-step, schottische or waltz. The only Required type tune is the Hoedown,

PRIZES: A dandy Rotary trophy to be awarded to the winner of the open. This trophy is to be brought back to the contest next year and will again be awarded, to the winner of the open. Ladies and Juniors: Trophy and \$15, \$10, and \$5. for top three. Intermediates: Trophy and \$30.,\$25., \$20., \$15., and \$10. Seniors:\$35.,\$25., \$20., \$15., and \$10. Opens: \$50., \$40., \$30., \$25., \$20., and \$10. Errors may be rectified before close of contest.

Ilwaco invites all fiddlers and followers to attend this contest. Good seats at a low rate. Weather on the beach is always good. Ilwaco is in the NW tip of Washington across Codumbia from Astoria. See you all at this contest.

So come and help make history by being a part of this training. As I have said before, it will not be judges only who will be welcome to come and learn. Everyone who is vitally interested in the judging of fiddle contest should plan to attend. This includes all fiddlers, even if you have never judged, or do not want to judge, a contest. This is because you will learn how to score better when you compete in a contest. Can you pass up the chance to learn how to do this?

Any Washington, Idaho or California fiddlers and officers of your Associations will be most welcome to attend. We will have the place, the program and the

expert. You plan to come or send a delegate.

I have nothing to add to the agenda. It will go on as given in last month's Hoedowner.

Here are the directions on how to get to the Whiteaker Elementary School, 21 North Grand St. Eugene. From The I-5 Freeway take Hiway 126 westerly for about 3.5 miles following the signs to downtown Eugene and "Ocean Beaches" to the first traffic light (First St.) turn right for ...4 miles to the next traffic light (Van Buren St.) turn right again for one block.
