MARSHALL JACKSON

Our Fiddler and Accompanist for the month of November

Marshall was born in Regent, North Dakota, September 4, 1911, the eldest in a large musical family. His parents were both music lovers, his father played a mouthorgan and his mother a pump organ. Marshall heard old-time fiddling from his early days, having listened to Warren Grey, now deceased, playing fiddle for old-time dances, but when he was 7, Marshall's family moved away from Regent and he lost contact with old-time fiddling for a time.

Marshall became "hooked" on fiddling in 1927 when he heard his friend Guy Sharpe playing in the old hotel in Halliday, North Dakota. He coaxed his dad into trading a load of prairie hay for an old beat-up guitar. He purchased an instruction book for 5 cents and with the aid of his friend, Ed Stockland, he learned to play.

From that time on, Marshall was in touch with old-time fiddling, but was not active in it until April 1966, when he attended a fiddling contest in Tillamook, Oregon and joined the Oregon Association.

Marshall is an accomplished musician, having played accompaniment on guitar, mandolin and banjo for various dance bands and musical groups through the years, but it wasn't until 1967 that he purchased his first fiddle and started learning to play it. At his age that was not easy, but with hard work he was able to accomplish a

fair degree of ability and has won several trophies; a second place in a contest at Canyon City, a second at Baker, a third at Enterprise (all of these in intermediate division) and also a fourth in the "opens" at Enterprise.

Marshall has won two first place and one second place "Best Liked Accompanist"

awards at the national contest in Weiser, Idaho for guitar accompaniment,

Marshall and his wife, Sarah, are the parents of seven children. He has worked at varied trades during his life and until he lost his sight in 1963 was a Tektron-ix supervisor in Portland. He is very much in demand as an accompanist expecially by the champion fiddlers who depend upon the strong pure chords of guitar to back them up at the contest. Many other accompanists in the Old-Time Fiddlers Association are very grateful to Marshall for his patience and help in getting them started. He especially enjoys working with young children.

Marshall has a firm conviction that "Everybody Should Fiddle A Liddle" and has

adopted those words as his motto.
