It is impossible to discuss Bluegrass music without immediately mentioning the name of Bill Monroe. For more than 40 years Monroe has shaped and polished this vibrant music which derives its name from his band, the Bluegrass Boys.

Today Monroe remains an entertainer of major importance. Monroe's band is an obligatory part of every major Bluegrass Festival, and Monroe's own Beanblossom Festival has become a pillar of our musical

heritage.

A life long resident of Western Kentucky, Monroe was exposed to ballads and Appalachian melodies by the music of his mother and brothers. Teaming up with his brothers in the early thirties Monroe infused the Old Timey String Band music with elements from the blues to create the Bluegrass Sound.

Cajun Music

THE BALFA BROTHERS learned their songs and playing styles from their musician-sharecropper father and neighborhood musicians around their hometown of Mamou in southwestern Louisiana.

DEWEY BALFA leads the group. He plays fiddle and sings. For the past ten years, he has had a popular weekly radio show devoted to Cajun music. He presently lives in Basile, Louisiana with his wife and one of his four daughters. Dewey owns and operates a furniture store, and drives a school bus. He has recently received a grant to bring Cajun music into the schools. In 1977, he was selected to serve on the National Endowment for the Arts Folk Arts Panel.

RODNEY BALFA is the group's guitarist and shares the singing. He lives in Mamou with his wife and three children where he is a brickmason by trade. He is known for his strong rhythmic style of playing the guitar. A musician friend once said that "Rodney plays the guitar as if he were laying bricks. He lays out steady blocks of sound."

MARC SAVOY was born and raised in Eunice, Louisiana. Inspired by his grandfather's fiddle playing and his parents' deep love for Cajun music, Marc has carried on the tradition. He owns and runs a music store where he makes and sells the Acadian Accordion, the most highly prized accordion in Louisiana today. The Savoy Music Center is a gathering place for musicians of all ages in southwest Louisiana. He plays the Cajun accordion when he joins the Balfa Brothers, and occasionally does twin fiddling harmonies with Dewey. Marc has made many 45 records on the Swallow label, can be heard on one of the Balfa Albums, and now for the most part plays with a band called the Louisiana Aces.
