NEGATIVE VIEWS ON SOUND POST TINKERING By Jack Batts

Of all the evals which have beset the makers of violins, that of sound post tinkering is the most foul. This malady is to be found most prevalent among the beginners in the profession, especially among those who are unfortunate in lacking background in the business.

Not only is this disease a waste of time of the individual, that might be better applied to a higher level of learning, but in many cases valuable violins have been practically destroyed by this obsession.

When a post is properly set in any reasonably well built violin, the violin itself, within a short time will adjust to the post. And if one is not capable of determining the proper post length and position the instrument should be put in the hands of a capable repairman.

Any slight change in humidity, barometric pressure, or temperature will have some bearing on the sound and feel of the violin. And he who believes that every evident change in the output of the instrument calls for a mad rush for the sound post setter, is in for a frustrating existence and his violin is in for a trip to the junk yard.

I have known good violinists who carried a sound post setter in their cases and worried the poor fiddle for hours before a concert, trying time after time, concert after concert, to bring the instrument up to peak performance to parallel with weather conditions. I have taken these same violins after the concert was played and found upon examination that the post touched only at one point, top and bottom, and with neither rhyme nor reason in its location or length.

When working at the bench with the aid of mirrors and lights, sometimes as much as an hour to make a post grow to top and bottom, neither too long nor too short, I am dumbfounded that an other wise intelligent person could imagine that he could jerk a post haphazardly and retain a fit or improve upon the tonal production acquired by my hours experienced labor.

I have not forgotten that one can bask in a world of fantasy and have learned over a period of years that the uninitiated pursuer of violin magic, can nearly always be listed among the world's nicest people. For some reason, the individual who believes and takes part in this merry chase has the innocence and lovable qualties which makes him akin to the humanness of the violin itself. And far be it for me to discourage the chase or deny him the entertainment of sound post tinkering. Do permit me however to plead with him to apply this tinkering to a violin of little value, and with study and time, hope that he may learn to set the post and leave it.

BARNEY ELLIS ALEXANDER

Barney Ellis Alexander was born in Stoutland, Missouri, May 28, 1913. He had no formal music training, but was always interested in music from an early age. When he was eight years old he received his first guitar and learned several tunes. He had a black friend by the name of Washington Vernon, who took him along to barn dances. When he was twelve, he borrowed his cousin's fiddle and learned to play it. It took him a week to learn one square dance. He played on the Springfield, Missouri Radio station KWTO and Joplin WMBH. He played dance halls for as little as \$2.00 a night. After coming to Oregon, he still played in bands and dance halls. Among them was Springers in Gresham, Terry Dumont's, Arky & Jolly Cowboys, Symphoners, Pals of the Golden West, as well as several Gospel Music Groups and several records. He has played with, backed-up or played for such notables as Spade Cooley, Tex Ritter, Tex Tyler, Smiley Burnette (Frog), Bob Wills, Billy Jack Wills, Willie Nelson and Sons of the Pioneers. Among some of the trophies and awards he has won are, Oregon State Champion, Senior Division, 1980, Judge at NOTFA contest at Weiser, 1982, 1st Place Tehama District 6. Senior. 3rd Place, Oregon State Seniors 1982, 2nd Place Seniors at Canyonville. 5th Place Seniors NOTFA Weiser 1981, 2nd Place Senior Drain 1978. 3rd Place Sr Canyonville 1981 and 4th Place Oregon State Senior 1981.

Tall, slim, affable and good natured, Barney was a barber by trade but has been retired for some time. Always friendly, he is always ready to help someone and show them the intracies. His "Cow crossing the Road" and "Tennesee Wagoner" are a real treat at any time. Those are just two of the hundreds of tunes he knows and plays in real chanpionship style.
