

LEW SEZ that he is looking for volunteers to help at the Fiddle Festival in Lincoln City. He needs helpers Friday afternoon for registration, and score-keepers Friday night. If you can help, please see him at the Convention or contact him at home.

Wayne Holmes is right, in his letter in the March "Hoedowner," that we have a time problem at many of the OOTFA events. And I don't have a good suggestion for solving it. But whatever we do, let's not try to solve our time crunch problem by excluding singers from the program, for several reasons.

First, variety does add to the entertainment value of the program. Moreover, consider who many of the singers are—they are often guitar players who spend much of their time in the self-effacing and essential role of accompanist for us fiddlers. They, too, enjoy a moment in the spotlight. I've been in their shoes, playing back up fiddle all evening for a vocal group, thinking, couldn't these singers have asked me to do one fiddle tune in a whole show? A third consideration is this: playing back up is part of fiddling, as much as playing solo. I think many of us enjoy the challenge of playing good back up, taking a break, then fading into the background, doing just the right fill at the end of a line of the song.

Oldtime music includes more than fiddling. We need the singers and other instrumentalists, and we need to keep them happy, too. Otherwise we may be standing around a piano with no one seated there playing chords, no guitar players, maybe no M.C., and not much audience.

JUST SOME "TIMELY" ADVICE

When musicians get together, I know they always have such fun standing around and "jamming." Usually they would jam for hours, and there is only one word that will make them stop. That word is "EAT." This is part of the fun-side of getting together, then comes time for the regular show for the public. Keep in mind that it is the AUDIENCE we are playing for, and their enjoyment of what they see and hear.

A few of you have forgotten a very important lesson we learned even down in grade school. I know. I was there! When it is your turn, it is IMPERATIVE that you be ready ON TIME. The audience does not like to sit and hear people call and hunt for you when it is your turn. You should not be out in some back room playing with some little "select group" and having your own fun. If you came to play for the public, BE READY TO PLAY FOR THEM ON TIME. If you are not there and ready within a few seconds, the MC should skip your turn and go on to the next person on the program. Since everyone else is aware of whose turn they follow, your turn should then be placed at the bottom of the program, if the MC graciously chooses to do so. Or if the program is a lengthy one, you may be skipped altogether.

During the program is not the time to do your practicing or your tuning-

up. If you expect to play, be READY TO PLAY, AND READY ON TIME.

APRIL FIDDLE FESTIVAL, LINCOLN CITY, APRIL 27, 28, & 29, 1990

Lee Jones and I have been meeting with the officials at the Ocean Lake Elks Lodge in Lincoln City. Our last meeting was March 19. We want to share the following information with you and encourage you to attend this year.

FRIDAY, APRIL 27, 1990: THE OCEAN LAKE ELKS LODGE will open at noon for jamming and for meeting friends. Be sure to sign in. You may, also, register for the fiddle contest and/or for the dance bands. You are encouraged to jam any where in the hall. The Elks' Lodge is located on the east side of the highway 101 on N. 22nd. As you drive into Lincoln City from the north - watch for the Dairy Queen on the left. Turn left at the light on to N. 22nd and the Lodge is just a few feet on the right. If you are coming from the south on 101 - drive north - crossing D River until you come to the Dairy Queen - turn right to the lodge. The lodge dining room is open to all of us.

PARKING: There is parking behind the lodge (to the east) for self-contained RV's. Last year we had to work our way around but there was room for all of us. If you come in your car, there is parking all around the lodge. Please save parking for the RV's.

6:30 - Jamming on the stage

7:00 - FIDDLE CONTEST BEGINS. We changed the rule book last year and we had many fine comments. All age and ability groups will be combined into one contest. Judging will be based on: Dance-abilty & Rhythm - 50 points. Style, timing, and tone - 25 points. Appropriate back up - 25. Dress - 10 points. Stage presence - 10 points. (120 total points). You are allowed up to four back-up. A contestant may play one or two tunes or a medley within a five minute time limit. Tunes that are appropriate for dancing are encouraged. Audience will be dancing during the contest. No rules apply to style, bowing, plucking, cross tuning, singing, etc. (If considered inappropriate by the judges, they may choose to score accordingly.) Complete contest rules will be available at the contest. Prizes will be: \$90, \$80, \$70, \$60, \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20, \$10, & \$5. The contest may last late into the evening. Participation is not limited to members of the O.O.T.F.A. but we are the sponsor and set the rules.

SATURDAY, APRIL 28 Building open for jamming. Many people will be attending to hear fiddle music. You are encouraged to form groups about the hall - both up stairs and down stairs - and jam, jam, jam. We have been asked by the lodge to have a caller and square dancing Saturday afternoon. Alan Ede has consented to be our caller. Sounds fun.

6:30 Jamming on the stage. About 7:15 we will start having a variety of fiddle dance bands play throughout the evening - until midnight or later. We will have groups much like our Saturday night dance at the state convention but it will not be by district. Individuals may "get up" a band and sign up. Time for playing will depend on how many bands we have. This evening is not a contest.

SUNDAY, APRIL 29: The state jam will begin at 1:00. It will be open to all fiddlers and some specials. (We may have a time limit in order to get everybody in). You are encouraged to jam downstairs while the "offical" jam is going on upstairs.

We are the guests of the Oceanlake Elks Lodge No. 1886. They are paying us to put on the contest and to entertain. They want *fiddle music* and lots of it. Plan on attending all or a part of the week-end. The facilities are beautiful. You will enjoy them.
