Greetings from your newest district. We have the bit in our teeth and are


off and running on a great start.

From BMOTFA Rosin Dust: From AARP Bulletin, Feb. 1992, "The Amazing Power of Music" Music's Muscle--Whatever the potential of music therapy, there's no question that more people are taking it seriously. Congress is getting ready to amend the Older Americans Act to authorize funding for research, training and education in music therapy. A bill to effect such changed passed the Senate last year after Oliver Sacks and a chorus of health professionals, musicians, patients and relatives sang its praises at a Senate Aging Committee Hearing. Congress is expected to approve the final bill early this year. Sacks believes the right kind of music may be of special benefit to people with neurological disorders -- and may even move those who can't walk to dance, those who can't speak to sing, those who can't remember very well remember. At Beth Abraham Hospital in the Bronx he noticed that music sometimes evoked a response when other forms of stimulation failed. The beat of jazz prompted one woman to pick up her fork and feed herself, a younger man would eat to rock 'n' roll, a 65year-old woman who had been silent for 40 years reached back across the abyss to retrieve every word of "Just a Song at Twilight." Music can be useful and get the results other therapies can't. It's a way to connect or get through to some who are not reachable. (J and B add "Anyway, it's FUN, especially when you can produce some yourself.")
