

there. The Quebe sisters from Texas are all fine young fiddlers but it was their interest in the old style of fiddling that was so wonderful. Sophia Quebe, in particular, shows an interest in the older traditions of Texas fiddling.

Knowing I had spent quite a lot of time with both Benny Thomasson and Orville Burns, she took the time to ask a lot of questions about the tunes they played, and the little things they did with the bow to make their fiddling what it was. I sat in the contest auditorium with her pointing out all the influences these two fiddlers have instilled in the tunes coming from the stage. It was so nice to find a young fiddler, with such ability, with this kind of interest in the older, more personal styles of this type of fiddling. She actually had me sit down and play some older oddball tunes, not the Weiser "hit parade" of tunes. I had a wonderful time visiting with her and her sisters Grace, and Hulda.

A young fiddler, Bonnie Riley, came to me to learn an older "B" part for Salt River that Luke Thomasson played. She knew I played the tune that way. Another young player, Justin Branum, from Arkansas played me a lot of stuff he had picked up from old jam session tapes of Orville Burns, playing guitar with him was a joy. Though no one will ever emulate Oville's bowing exactly, it is inspiring to see the young folks trying it. For so long the younger fiddlers at the bigger contests were so robotic in their playing, now it is a joy to see them paying attention to the great fiddlers that came before us. They were not the only ones I enjoyed hearing this year. The Ludiker kids, Dennis and Kimber also play a lot of the older tunes, and do well in the contests with them. I perceive a slight change from the "play to win" mindset, and a lot of the younger fiddlers are to be commended for it.

Weiser is always fun, lasting over a week for most of us, a person has

plenty of time for fiddling, visiting, meeting new folks, etc. On the other end of the scale, it was so nice to see and hear Mylie Barron there again. Mylie is over 90 years old and I maintain one of the best Canadian fiddlers alive. Nothing but tradition in his playing, still playing so nice. He is an inspiration to me not only for his fiddling, but for the fact that all his life he worked as a carpenter, in other words, tough labor work. He is still a phenomenal fiddle player.

Though the judging was erratic, good fiddlers winning, but also many good fiddlers being cut out early, all in all it was a great year at Weiser and the folks that put it all on are to be thanked. Other memorable times I had were jamming with Levi Dennis, Sherry McKenzie, playing in a fun session with Joey McKenzie and Tony Ludiker.
