I just sent the following profundities to our little Guthrie "band." I'll pass 'em on to you as well. (Jim Hockenhull)

After our last gig Sally mentioned something about interacting with the audience. Here's what I keep in mind when playing in public:

- * Make eye contact with the audience. Not constantly, but once in a while. Occasionally pick out a person and sing or play to him/her -- again, not constantly but for a while.
- * Smile. (Not constantly, but once in a while.) The audience is there to have a good time; it helps if you're having a good time or at least look like you are.
- * Banter. A little bit of talk to the audience, and a little bit of cross-chatter among the performers loosens things up. (Talk can be overdone, however -- they're here for MUSIC -- and out-and-out comedy is

difficult, probably should be left to comedians.)

*Acknowledge applause -- a smile, a little bow, a "thank you," a pause before launching into the next number. Let them know that you appreciate their response.

*If you're screwing up badly, admit it. (I have an old record on which the string-band gets off to a very rocky start. The leader stops things and hollers, "Gentlemen, if you ain't right, get right!" and off they go again.) But remember that you probably sound better to them than you do to yourself. These little things have helped me. Thought I'd pass them along for whatever they're worth.
