Greetings From your President

I would like to thank everyone who helped make my year as your president an easy stint. This includes all of the district chairpersons. Sharon Gallagher. Judy McGarvey, Scott Phillips and many of you who are now reading this. I am sure that you will be as helpful to your new president, Jack

Since this is my last article as your president. I would like to make a few comments. I have been recently asked what I thought was old time music. I believe that old time music is a style of playing music. Its roots are from the British Isles and Africa and made up the songs that were played at dances and sung at home and around campfires. It was originally only a fiddle and a

During the 19th and early 20th centuries, other stringed instruments began to be added to the fiddle-banjo duo; these included the guitar, mandolin, and double bass (or washtub bass), which provided chordal and bass line accompaniment (or occasionally melody also). This, along with a dobro, or resonator guitar, is also considered to be 'standard' bluegrass instrumentation, but old-time music tends to focus on sparser instrumentation and arrangements than bluegrass. Such an assemblage, of whatever instrumentation, became known simply as a "strina band." Occasionally the cello, piano, hammered dulcimer. Appalachian dulcimer, tenor banjo, tenor quitar, mouth bow, or other instruments have been used, as well as such non-string instruments as the jug, harmonica, Jew's harp, concertina, accordion, washboard, spoons, triangles or bones.

The OOTFA standing rules are vague about these other instruments, but very specific about not allowing electric, drums,

woodwind (except harmonica) or brass instruments. Actually piano, accordion, and harmonia are NOT woodwind instruments, but they are wind instruments, so maybe that is why they have been allowed. My feeling is that if someone can play

these instruments appropriately and not so loud as to outplay the fiddlers, then they are welcome. That is not an official OOTFA policy, just the way I feel. We have had folks come with penny whistles, and bohdrans and play Irish music which was just great.

Old Time music does not have to be Tunes such as Ashokan Farewell and Lover's Waltz were written recently and have become part of the genre because of the style of playing the music. I believe they now belong in the category of "Old Time" music.


In reality, OOTFA, for the most part, no longer plays much "Old Time" music. members have such a diverse musical interest that at any jam we may hear County/ Western, iazz, songs from the Great American Songbook (Hollywood, Broadway and Tin Pan Alley), bluegrass, folk and everything in between. I personally love all of these musical forms, but I would hope that we can move back to some more traditional Old Time music.

Perhaps having some part of each jam or performance dedicated solely to traditional old time music might even bring back some members who have left because we no longer play what they consider to be old time In fact, it is very hard to find many music. OOTFA members that know or can play many of the Appalachian old time tunes and this may be a way to teach more people about this type of musical form. At the same time we need to provide an opportunity for all of our members to play and participate, even if it is "The Key of R" or "Faded Love". Just my opinion......


