I am pleased to tell you that our Board has approved the creation of a permanent endowment fund of \$260,000 with Oregon Community Foundation. All performances need be approved by the District Chairman or designate before committing other members to play. No one should commit other OOTFA performers without their approval. This is just common courtesy. If you are playing solo, or have already arranged for the individual performers in advance for a specific gig that is not open to all members, then a simple notice prior to any public announcement to the chairperson or designate is expected. If you expect to have non-OOTFA members be a major portion of the gig, then it would not be appropriate to advertise this as an Oregon Old Time Fiddler's performance.

Hope you all have a wonderful Thanksgiving and don't hurt your back raking too many leaves (that's why leaf blowers were invented!). And don't forget to pay your dues!

Shannon Stein

As a kindergarten student, Shannon found her inspiration for playing violin in an unusual way. One day, a violinist from the Oregon Symphony came to visit her rural classroom on the Oregon coast. As he spoke, he held up his bow and asked if anyone knew what animal helped make his bow. He unscrewed the ferrule and shook the bow to show that it was made with strands of hair. While "cats" or "monkeys" seemed most reasonable to the kids, when the man said, "horses," Shannon's eyes lit up! She suddenly knew she just had to own one herself. (It seemed to her the closest she could get to a real horse.) Her parents agreed and bought her a 1/8 size violin later that year.

So, at age six Shannon began lessons with Jackie Cone, friend, and self-taught violinist. Jackie's gentleness helped Shannon through the early frustration of not being able to play like a pro right away. Fresh tunes were constantly put before her and soon Shannon was rapidly sight-reading music, as if by magic. Shannon's dad bought himself a mandolin so he could teach himself and play with her. Then, Mrs. Cone invited Shannon to go see the Old Time Fiddlers up in Winchester Bay. They were having fun, but could little Shannon be brave enough to perform with strangers? She learned to play "Texas Gales," "Devil's Dream" and "Swallowtail Jig" with dad, and it wasn't long before Shannon was on stage, a contributing member of the Old Time Fiddlers.

Three years ago, with help from District 5, Shannon and her family went to the Thousand Trails camp where Shannon met her first best friend; a "super-good" fiddler her own age. Shannon has learned so much from her California buddy. The music Shannon has learned at Thousand Trails is especially valuable since she doesn't have a dedicated fiddle instructor. (Shannon currently studies Suzuki method with Myriam Harvey and is in book Six.) Fiddle tunes learned at camp have always been lively music such as last year's "Leather Britches" and this summer's, "Val's Dream" and "Catharsis." Since those first times playing before a large audience, whether worship, classical or fiddle music, Shannon has enjoyed playing on many stages. She especially loves it when she is helping raise money for a good cause. OOTFA has given her a wonderful circle of loving, supportive friends that she can always count on to cheer her on.

Fiddle Tips, by Eileen Walter

Almost every day I hear someone say this: "There just isn't enough time to work on my fiddling" - But wait: Maybe there really is! We could approach our practice time in a different way. Progress on this instrument comes in small increments, and improvements can be made by setting small attainable goals. Choose something that you can succeed at during a short practice session. My goal in writing this monthly column is to offer some short suggestions. I encourage you to email me at: Eileen@portlandfiddleteacher.com with your comments and ideas.

Make Friends with a Loud Metronome. The Intelli IMT-301 Metro Tuner is a great one – it's also a chromatic tuner among many other things (it does just about everything except clean your house – darn!). If you're not accustomed to playing along with a metronome, begin slowly, and play on open strings. Set the tempo on 40 and change bow directions along with the click. When it's easy, increase the tempo to 60, 80, 100, 120, 140, 160......Then, go back to 40, and play one down-bow and one up-bow with each click – in other words, you'll be changing bow directions between each click as well as on each click. Gradually increase the tempo. Then, go back to 40, and change bow directions on every other click. Gradually increase the tempo. Then go back to 40 and combine the exercises described above - play one bow for 2 clicks, then one bow for one click, and then 2 bows for one click, and repeat......Gradually increase the tempo. When you're comfortable with these exercises – play a scale 3 different ways - with a click on each note, with 2 clicks for each note, and with 2 notes for one click. Vary the tempo. Now you're ready to play a tune with your new friend!


