From Your President =

As members, we should be aware of our roots and strive to represent that older music in our playing.

Of course, times change and we have fewer members that know the old time tunes, so we should ask ourselves, "Are we actually preserving and perpetuating our old time tradition? And how can we do that better?" Currently we can thank Lew Holt and Linda Danielson, who have documented a large part of the early OOTFA music and history. Their contributions are important to us, as they help deepen our understanding of the traditions we want to preserve.

In future issues of the Hoedowner, I will write about other member-generated ideas I have received. It is important to discuss topics like these openly amongst our membership so that we can all grow in a positive direction that will make OOTFA thrive, attract more members and successfully demonstrate our mission statement.

From the Editor Emeritus =

Most of you probably don't remember Al Lively from Bandon. Al died this summer after an extended illness. Those of us who have been members of OOTFA for many years knew him when he was an active leader of District 5. People are remembered for different reasons. Al wasn't known for his great musical skills, although Al did play the stand-up bass. But rather I remember Al for his easy going and friendly mannerism. Behind that quiet man was a thinker who only wanted the best for District 5. He was devoted to his role as chairman -- transporting and setting up the sound equipment, signing up the musicians and making sure that everybody was treated equally and fairly.

I don't remember the first time that I met most friends, but I do remember meeting Al for the first time. It was back in the late 70s, before Alice and I had become members of OOTFA. Alice and I were just becoming interested in the "old time fiddlers." We went to the District 5 jam in Bandon, which was held in the elementary school during the Cranberry Festival.

About half way through the jam, the school fire siren went off. Naturally it distracted the audience and musicians. Because I was a "stranger" at the jam, I sat back a bit. But because I had had experience with fire alarms in elementary schools (I was the

one who set them off several times a year for fire drills), I got up and walked down the hall looking for a "fire alarm box" that had been tripped. I met Al in the hall. We walked until we found the box. The glass covering the alarm button was broken. I pushed in on the button and the screaming siren became silent. I could have been the little Dutch boy who held his finger in the dike all night, but rather than having me stand there all afternoon, we had to devise some way to hold the button in. Finally with a little stick that we found, we created a make-shift wedge to hold in the button. The show went on and that was the day I first met Al Lively.

Little did I dream that afternoon that I would be a member of District 5 and also be chairman for a number of years working closely with AI (and later with Pat Kraemer). AI was the one who taught me the traditions of our association. AI focused on the fiddler and his or her contribution to our "fiddlers association." AI respected the beginning fiddler as well as the best. He invited Alice and me to play many times before we finally got up enough nerve to stand on the stage at the VFW HaII in Bandon to play. What a "terrifying" experience that was. Through AI we were made welcome and have many fond memories of the years when we lived in District 5

It's hard to believe that an entire year has passed since Dallen Mathias, age 12, has started playing the fiddle. Learning the fiddle has been both challenging and fun. At first glance Dallen says, "The fiddle looked challenging!" Judy McGarvey from District 4 drove all the way from Medford to Allegany, about a three hour drive, to give Dallen and the rest of the kids in Allegany their first lessons. Dallen remembers being sized for his fiddle and learning "Mary Had a Little Lamb". Dallen says, "That took about two minutes!"

After that, Judy worked with everyone on "Old Joe Clark" and "Bile Them Cabbage Down". This was the beginning of Dallen's wonderful journey into old time fiddle music. Since that first lesson, Dallen has continued to take lessons from Judy, who comes to Allegany once a month, along with many of the District 5 old time fiddlers, and enjoys meeting new people and playing his fiddle. Along with fiddling, Dallen loves to swim in the river, build forts, and play with his friends.

Fiddle Tips - Using Ring Tones to Make Your Fiddle Sing - by Roland White

Have you ever heard one fiddle played...that sounded like two fiddles...and the tone was extra rich & the fiddle just seemed to "sing" with extra tones? More than likely you have heard it, and that's one of the many reasons you love fiddle music. Here is an easy way to start playing using your open strings as ring tones to enhance your playing.

Ring tones are any notes that are played that are the same as any of the strings on your fiddle. So G, D, A & E strings will ring whenever you play notes that are one of the strings with that note. Here's an example. Have you observed that when you hit your A note on the G string, your A string will vibrate sympathetically? Try this: first tune your fiddle, then bow a long A note on the G string to watch the A string vibrate on its own. Now move your finger until the A note is flat or sharp and watch the string stop vibrating. Now slide back in tune, and you will see it vibrate again.

The easiest way to start using ring tones right away are the "unison and octave ring tones". For unison tones, they are always found with the 4th Finger creating the same note as the next open string. Here they are:

G String unison note is 4th Finger D note played with Open D String • Unison D Drone D String unison note is 4th Finger A note played with Open A String • Unison A Drone A String unison note is 4th Finger E note played with Open E String • Unison E Drone

For octave ring tones, at the end of the G,D,& A scales, your ending note is the scale name and should be your 3rd finger which you play with your next lower open string. Here they are:

3rd Finger D String is G Note Played with Open G String Octave G Drone 3rd Finger A String is D Note Played with Open D String Octave D Drone 3rd Finger E String is A Note Played with Open A String Octave A Drone

Take that thought one step further and realize that your fiddle wants to vibrate with the proper pitch rather than the improper one. What better way than to use your own fiddle to play in tune using open strings and ring tones?

Have fun and listen for the sweetness!

Tune of the Month -- Reginald's Waltz:



In that case, you need to pay the \$25 which actually covers the cost of printing and mailing the Hoedowner. If you only want to get it as a PDF directly from the printer, let your Membership Chair know and it will come to you at NO CHARGE. You can also go online at the OOTFA website and read it there.
