

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This day in District 4, with heavy hearts, we said goodbye to a wonderful person who was not only known and loved in our group but throughout the state for his willingness to help preserve the old time music. He was a musician of many talents, a kind and patient teacher, a talented dancer and a wonderful friend. Patrick Manion is at his well deserved rest. His memorial highlighted his service to our country in the Air Force. Upon hearing the news broadcasts of the attack on Pearl Harbor, he hitchhiked to the nearest enlistment station and joined. Achieving the honor of being in the top one percent of his inductees he earned his Chief Master Sargeant's rank early on. Pat served in World War II, Korea and some of the Vietnam conflict.

Upon retiring from active duty he devoted 23 years to the Central Point School System, teaching Social Studies. As a youth Pat had his own band who played for many of the high school dances in his hometown in in Arizona, where he mostly played banjo and guitar. In 1994, after he and Joan attended many dances here in the Rogue Valley, he decided to dust off his musical instruments and started playing his fiddle and guitar at the OOTFA jams and also did a term as chairman of District 4. Having such a love for music, he and Joan opened their home to those of us who had played as children and wanted to pick it up again but needed help, and one student who had never even held a musical instrument but had a deep yearning to play the fiddle. 

Junior Fiddler: Noelle Stasak, District 5



Noelle Stasak is 8 years old and has been hearing fiddle tunes since she was born as she listened to her older siblings play. At 1 ½ she attended her first fiddle camp (as a guest, not a student), and a few years later, when she was 5, she began to play fiddle. One of her favorite tunes is Tennessee Waltz. Noelle also enjoys playing outside with the neighbor's ponies, bike riding, rollerblading, drawing, sewing, crafts, cooking with Mama, and having tea parties. Her future plans involve playing the fiddle and contest fiddling.

Fiddle Tips by Evelyn Horner (District 6)

Evelyn Horner has brought fiddle instruction to young and old. She taught classes at Shasta Jr. College in American Fiddle, has toured the White House with her students and played for President Reagan. For nine years, she taught fiddle for the California Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. She's in the hall of fame for Western Swing, and if that's not enough...she loves to quilt and can her own home-grown veggies and fruits. We are lucky to have her with us!

Tips on Jamming for Beginners:

Jamming, I think, is the best part of playing fiddle. Besides playing with old friends and meeting new ones, it's a great place to learn.

When I first started playing, I would jam until 5 A.M. Contests seemed to be my favorite place. I only knew a few tunes, but by 5 A.M., I could play a few more. Jamming is so much fun that many fiddlers arrive at the contests two days early just to do more jamming.

If you can play 3 tunes, you can have fun in a jam. First have your tunes ready. I have my

students write down all the tunes they play with the key. Keep this list in your fiddle case. Bring along a small tape recorder to record new tunes and variations of tunes you may want to practice on at home. Walk around and check out the jams going on. Find the one that fits your style. Make sure your fiddle is in tune. Play along with the jam, playing long or short notes in harmony, if you don't know the tune. After a while, if they haven't played your tunes, ask if they know them. In most cases, they will jump on it and you'll be on your way. If the first jam doesn't work for you, don't give up. Find another or grab a fiddler and a guitar player and start your own jam. Play your tunes and in most cases a few wandering fiddlers will join in.

Jamming in a sit down circle can be fun too. Usually the fiddlers will take turns on tunes to play going around the circle. Everybody will start playing the tune a few times, then variations may be introduced by solo fiddlers, then everyone together will end the tune and on to the next.

I feel it's always polite to ask the group if they know the tunes you introduce. I've seen many jams break up if a fiddler keeps playing their own tunes nobody knows so they can solo. When you start out your tune, make sure you give out the key for the group and count off, so everyone will come in at the same time. The fiddler that starts the tune will also end it. I look at the other players midway on the last A or B part and raise my foot up for a signal. Everyone seems to know the tune will end on the last phrase.

All the fiddlers I know (and I know quite a few) are warm friendly people who are there to play music just like you. Jump in and don't be shy. It's more fun to play and learn than to watch.


Tune of the Month October, 2016: Paddy on the Handcar

This version is published in "Roses in Winter: A Celebration of Fiddlers in Washington State," edited by Stuart Williams and Brid Nowlan. Forty years ago, Stuart and I were learning this tune together, from Wes Brunson of Milwaukie. As I recall, he came to Oregon from North Dakota. A favorite throughout Ireland, Scotland, Canada, and the northern U.S., this tune is part of a large and varied family of tunes, most of which were titled "Paddy on the Turnpike." "Handcar" in the title of this one pretty clearly connects this version to the U.S. and the Irish immigrants working on the railroad.

Kelly strives to teach them how to make a pleasing sound and reliable rhythm, introducing them to basic Cajun two-step and waltz tunes.

Students shared that Kelly was always really helpful and that they especially liked inventing their own stories and song and performing them in a recital with Kelly accompanying on guitar. The experience has students and their parents seeking teachers and mentors who will expand on their child's introduction to fiddling. Kelly, of Oakridge, specializes in Cajun-style, which can be quickly accessible to youngsters. He has a carful of child-sized fiddles, most of which he has acquired through online shopping.


