#### From the Editor Emeritus =

When Alice and I first joined the old time fiddlers about 1980, we were in awe of the music and of the fiddlers. One fiddler, Bill Yohey, was held in great respect by the members – both for his fiddling and early leadership. He was one of the charter members back in 1966. One summer in the middle 80s, Alice acquired another fiddle. She took it to the campout at Vernonia and showed Bill her new fiddle. Bill took it, looked it over, and I remember clearly him saying, "You never tell a lady that she has an ugly baby." This was his way of saying that you never tell a lady that she has an ugly fiddle. To this day I respect what he told Alice and have personally tried to live by it - both dealing with fiddles and with people.

Bill lived in McMinnville. One time- a year before we moved from North Bend to the valley, we went to see Bill, knowing that he was ill. His wife greeted us at the door. We told her that we had come to see Bill. She told us that it wouldn't be possible because of his condition but that she was lonely and would like for us to visit with her. Bill died shortly after our visit.

#### Bill Yohey McMinnville, Oregon

"My contribution to the Hoedowner this month is my autobiography. I was born at Mount Clair, Nebraska, Dec. 6, 1919, to George and Lilly Yohey, a fiddling bricklayer and one of the better piano players of that day. If I become something in the musical world, I owe it to my talented mother's teachings.

My first paying job was in Casper, Wyoming, playing banjo at the Country Club Golf Course. Square dancing was again becoming popular and my job was accompanying a local fiddler and his wife on piano. This job lasted longer than expected, and the following week I found employment in a restaurant and lounge singing and playing rhythm guitar with a western group. After observing the patrons quickly eat and finish their cocktails, the management asked me to refrain from singing and just play the quitar.

About this time, war clouds were gathering in the Far East, and the government asked me to join other friends who were leaving with the Wyoming National Guard. We arrived in Fort Lewis, Washington on February 14, 1941. December 8, 1942 found my regiment, the 115 Mech. Cavalry, at Corvallis, Oregon. T'was there I met my wife while she was attending Oregon State College. She followed me to several outposts throughout the Northwest, and I finally consented to marry this lady September 18, 1942, at the chapel in Fort Lewis, Washington. Louisiana, California, Oregon, Washington, Maryland, and Kentucky saw our 1938 Chevy coupe with the essentials of a traveling soldier and a pretty wife. I was sent overseas in July 1945 to Tacloban, Leyte, and later to Fusan and Seoul, Korea. Greeting me on my return six months later was Edna and our first born. . . a son, Patrick. Later came a daughter, Jeannie.

Discharged in 1946, I returned to McMinnville and went to work at the only trade I know. . . bricklaying. Of course my hobby is music. I've strived to learn something of the business and so become a better musician every day. Many facets of entertainment have entered in the mainstream of my playing career. On stage I've followed several dog acts, junior baton twirlers, rock and roll bands, wrestling and dancing bears, pantomime acts, choirs and champion banjo and fiddle players. I've played my instruments at super market openings, fairs, rodeos, banquets, funerals, weddings, various clubs and cocktail lounges, open air dance halls, granges, barn dances, volunteer Fire Departments, and others I'd like to forget! My favorite instruments are the tenor quitar, banjo, mandolin, and fiddle. I have made the stereo album called "Twenty Country Strings."

I asked Edna how one ends an autobiography and she says just quit. . . so I will. See you at the next jam session and show."

Other options for RV's include the Silver Lake Trailer Park with hookups and the K&K RV Park, also with hookups. RV accommodations are also available at Christmas Valley and Summer Lake. Use Google to discover more accommodation information that I've presented here.

# Oregon State Fiddle Contest-March 17 Chemeketa Community College in Salem



Fiddle contests have been a folk tradition in many countries for more than 300 years and provide an opportunity for fiddlers, other musicians, and audiences to gather and enjoy a show for each other and for the public, and to perpetuate fiddling and fiddle tunes. Many a fiddler has been inspired and motivated to practice new tunes after attending a contest. Many people form lifelong friendships at these events.

If you need any convincing about attending the upcoming contest (March 17 in Salem), contact me – maybe I can talk you into it! If you're thinking about competing (just remember –it's just a show – think of it as a jam) and you're not sure you know the "right tunes", you may be surprised. Even if you have a small repertoire of tunes, you most likely know a hoedown, a waltz, and a tune that's not a hoedown or waltz (such as a jig, rag, polka, swing tune, schottische, clog, fox trot, 2-step, etc.) Here are a few common tunes in these categories (of course there are thousands of possibilities):

I love this tune, and it's one of the few fiddle tunes I know in C. If you learn it, let me know. I'd love to play it with you sometime.

"Farewell Trion" is an old time tune from Alabama. The source for the tune is a fiddler from Mentone, Alabama named Mack Blalock (1914-1987) who got it form his uncle Joe Blaylock. Joe Blaylock (born 1854) who composed it upon returning to Alabama after getting laid off from a cotton mill that closed down for a time in Trion, Georgia. James Bryan added a third part to the tune. He plays it on You Tube. Just search for "Farewell Trion", and a few different recordings pop up. They're all great.

The expression, "pennies from heaven", is more than an idle idiom. Sasha Chernoff, a District 6 member and fiddler since 2011, is looking over us. At our Quarterly Business Meeting on January 13, Darla Knudsen had the singular honor of presenting to District 6 a bequest of \$18,665.31. Sasha's legacy is designated specifically for helping people to learn and improve on their instruments. In talking with her dearest friend, Lydia Lord, a musician and the executor of her estate, she recalled that Sasha and friend, Melinda Tims, attended fiddle camps at Westfir, and enjoyed a grand experience. As a result, Sasha began to craft a plan to perpetuate opportunities for others.

My first personal encounter with Sasha was at a summer music camp hosted at the Shedd Institute and instructed by Jenny Humphrey.
